Scholarships will be awarded to winners. There will be two \$1500, two \$1000, and two \$500 scholarships awarded. Submissions to be received from JANUARY 1-MARCH 31, 2026. The contest is open to high school sophomores and juniors in Western North Carolina.

Essays are to be no more than 500 words on one of the following topics:

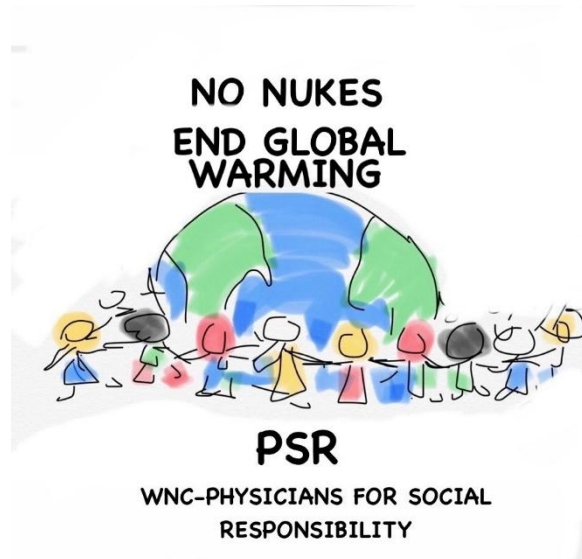
Why do we need to abolish nuclear weapons and how do we start?

How do low-income and socially disadvantaged communities disproportionately experience the effects of climate change?

Over eight school districts have been contacted, plus a number of private schools. The deadline for submitting the essay is March 31, 2026.

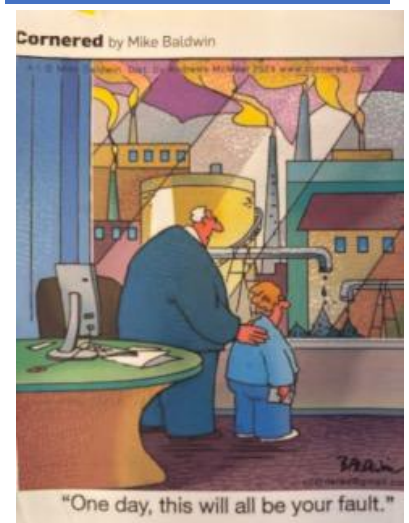

Before we return to "Star Wars" and an accelerated arms race, we should consider that the required 100% reliability is not possible. Our adversaries will counter with increased numbers of more elusive missiles which are projected to cost a tenth of what we spend on defense, and our already dangerous world will become even more so.

John F. Kennedy delivered a wise and prescient address at American University on June 10, 1963, at the height of The Cold War. He called for detente, arms reduction, a comprehensive test ban and gave the firm warning "peace was imperative". Peace begins with the western democracies taking the lead and all nuclear weapon states honoring their obligations under article 6 of the bedrock 1970 Nonproliferation Treaty: they agreed to continuing negotiations leading to the elimination of nuclear weapons-no foolish dangerous threats- detente- arms reductions.

Real security can come only with the diplomacy that convinces the authoritarian states that rigidly verified arms reduction, not weapons in space, is in everybody's best interest.
